

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TONY'S REFLECTION A NEW LIFE

We have reached the climax of the liturgical year, the highest peak of salvation history, when all that has been anticipated and promised is to be fulfilled. In fact, the entire Christian faith hinges on the event on Easter Sunday. If Jesus didn't rise from the dead, we should all go home and find something else to do. St. Paul says so much when he acclaims, "If Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain" (1 Cor. 15:14,19). Jesus took the worst of what the world could throw at Him and returned alive and triumphant. Through the Resurrection, Jesus shows us the ironic paradox of how death is now dead.

Today, a great victory is announced. Life defeats death. Good triumphs over evil. Yet, a quick glance at John's reading and one might be perplexed at the absence of such a jubilant decree. After all, there is no dramatic appearance of the risen Jesus, nor any proclamation by angels at the tomb. The final verse even states that the disciples "did not yet understand the Scripture that He had to rise from the dead." Given such an extraordinary event, why not more poetic fireworks? While it might seem that Scripture is not speaking in grandiose terms on the surface, much is packed into this scene. Notice the repetition of the word "tomb" - seven times in nine verses. Jesus's followers saw the evidence of what Christ had promised them: that God would raise Him on the third day. Therefore, for St. John, the phrase "empty tomb" is code for announcing the grand news that Jesus has triumphed over death.

St. John even goes into detail on Peter's description of the burial cloth - how the cloth that covered Jesus' head was rolled up in a separate place. The recognition of the burial cloths reveals that Jesus hadn't been carted off by grave robbers, who usually stole the expensive burial linens and left the corpse behind. In Jesus's tomb, the opposite had taken place. By going into the minutiae of the empty tomb description, St. John is telling us that something miraculous is afoot. Jesus has casually put aside the fabrics of death's sleep, folding them up like old pajamas, and has left the tomb for good; therefore, we are left with a penetrating reality that, out of the fragments of dying, Christ's tomb is not the dark end but a light-filled beginning. This means that in our own lives, we don't have to live as though death is our master. In light of the Resurrection, we can begin to see earthly life as a gestation place toward something higher, more permanent, and more splendid.

I know it's challenging to think beyond the here and now and merely say death has been defeated, but take time this Easter season to contemplate that there is more going on than death, than the absence of a loved one. No, what is very much in play is that, after the body experiences the decay of death, the soul, assuming it clings to Christ, can finally become alive in Christ. Knowing this, that pesky fear of death we hold on to can be brushed aside, much like Christ's burial cloths were on Easter Sunday.
