

REFLECTION FROM SEMINARIAN JAMES GROSSHEIM

Perhaps one of the most shocking images depicted in the Old Testament is the Tower of Babel incident. Early humans had progressed to such a point that they could realistically organize themselves into some kind of society efficient enough to build a great tower or ziggurat. Why would they attempt such a construction project? Genesis is clear: to make a name for themselves. God's response? To disorganize and scatter humankind, disrupting their construction.

One of our most basic human instincts is the instinct to worship. Even those who claim to reject belief in God often worship something. They put one thing at the center of their lives or desire to be part of something bigger than themselves. The problem of our ancient ancestors at Babel was not that they refused to worship, but that they worshipped themselves. Instead of offering God a Hosanna, they tried to make a name for themselves among the gods. They wanted to earn their way into divine status.

Taught by the One True God himself, we seek to become like gods in a different way. By worshipping God, we become more like him. We worship God by offering sacrifice, especially by offering Jesus's sacrifice of his Body and Blood on the Cross, re-presented in the Holy Mass. But if we are to truly become like God, then we have to offer not only Jesus's Body and Blood, but also our own lives with the Eucharist on the altar. The Offertory, when the priest receives the bread and wine at the altar, is a perfect time to lay ourselves down in prayer upon the altar, upon the paten and in the chalice, offering ourselves to God so he can use us for the salvation of others.

The priest always has a specific intention for which he offers the Mass. We can also offer ourselves at Mass for specific intentions. A visionary named Luisa Piccarreta once saw, during Mass, crowds of guardian angels approaching the altar from the pews, many carrying great golden bowls filled with the offerings of the people they represented—people who came to Mass to worship in their hearts and pray for noble intentions. Other angels held nothing because those they represented before God neglected to come to Mass with an intention for which to pray. We were all made to worship. Each of us was made to offer our great Hosanna to God. What Hosanna will your heart bring to the next Mass? For whom will you offer it?

TONY'S REFLECTION

Less Is More

In Catholic theology the first path towards one's union with God is called the purgative way. The purgative way suggests a purging, an eradication from sin and the disordered attachments of the world. One of the keys of the spiritual life is to reach a mental state in which you are detached from material pleasures. To get to this stage, you train yourself to view material possessions as distractions so you can more easily let them go. Today, we are presented with texts that remind us that human happiness is not to be found in the accumulation of material goods. Riches are fleeting and empty. We are called instead to "store up treasure in heaven, where neither rust nor moth destroy, where thieves cannot break in and steal."

The Old Testament book, Ecclesiastes, may be considered a philosophical "thought-experiment." It is an attempt to find out what happens when you focus only on temporal, material, and unaided reason. The results are meager. The reader learns it does not lead to happiness, but to despondency.

In the Gospel, we are presented with a parable of the rich fool. Seeing that family wealth is causing tensions, Jesus responds with a parable on the danger of excessive material possessions. In the parable, the foolish man hoards his resources as if it'll provide him security and happiness. Consequently, he then becomes lazy especially in the spiritual life and seeks only to "rest, eat, drink, and be merry." His obsession with possessions leads him to a life of gluttony where he merely indulges in his appetites and removes a God-focused mentality. What's more the rich man's anxiety and toil in his resources expose his lack of faith in God's care and provision.

We notice that it is not the production of wealth per se that merits this man's condemnation, but his plan to hoard it for his own comfort. The creation of wealth in itself can be good as Proverbs emphasizes. "A slack hand causes poverty, but the hand of the diligent makes rich" (Prov 10:4). The productivity of the land of the wealthy man could have been an indication of natural virtues: prudence, self-discipline, hard work, as it is in the case of the Woman of Noble Character (Prov 31). Rather, it is the intent to consume the wealth in self-indulgence that is vicious. The sin comes in spending the gained wealth on our pleasure and comfort, rather than spending it for the love of others and of God. Here, wealth becomes an impediment because it becomes a God-substitute that thwarts total devotion to God. It's hard to give God your attention when your attention is infatuated with material things.

The key hinge with wealth and poverty is what lies inside. Material poverty in itself is not virtuous, because material poverty may be the result of laziness, imprudence, addiction, or some other vice. That is why Jesus teaches that "blessed are the poor in spirit," which may be interpreted as "those who are poor for the sake of the Spirit," that is, for spiritual ends, not simply because of laziness or incompetence.

In the end, we must let go of all earthly attachments. The motto for material possessions is "less is more." Let us purge earthly possessions so we'll have room for heavenly riches.
