
LIGHTING PROJECT COMPLETE



PRIESTHOOD SUNDAY

REFLECTION FROM JAMES GROSSHEIM

Today is a feast day both universal and very local. In the Diocese of Nashville, we celebrate Priesthood Sunday, which concludes National Vocations Awareness Week. All week we've been growing in our awareness that every Christian is



called by God to dedicate their life to the glory of God and the salvation of souls. We are all called to become great saints, even in small and hidden ways. But to accomplish this goal, God calls us to particular states of life: Marriage, Consecrated Life, and Holy Orders.

The priesthood we celebrate today is the Priesthood of Jesus Christ, which we glimpse in today's Gospel. Jesus enters the Court of the Gentiles in the Temple, a space where even non-Jews could come and worship the one true God. Instead of finding a place of prayer, however, he encounters a noisy marketplace. By driving out the vendors, he restores space for the Gentiles to pray, quoting Isaiah: My house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples.

Catholic priesthood enables the People of God to worship rightly within the Church. It is fitting, then, that we unite the celebrations of Priesthood Sunday and the Dedication of the Basilica of St. John Lateran, because the priesthood and the sacred buildings in which we worship are deeply connected. Without the priesthood, we cannot celebrate the Mass; and without the Mass, we have no priesthood.

Next month, I complete my studies at seminary and return to the diocese for full-time ministry. I hope to be ordained a priest next summer. As my time in seminary draws to a close, I am humbled by the generosity of the people of the Diocese of Nashville over the past seven years. Without your prayers and financial support, my preparation for ordination would have been nearly impossible. I eagerly look forward to returning to full-time ministry, when, God willing, my priestly heart will move me to create spaces for prayer in the hearts and lives of the People of God, just as Jesus did.

CELEBRATING PRIESTHOOD SUNDAY

This weekend, Saint Matthew joins parishes across the Diocese of Nashville in celebrating Priesthood Sunday and supporting the Seminarian Education Fund. This fund covers the cost of educating and forming our future priests—about \$75,000 per seminarian each year—including tuition, housing, and other essential expenses.

Your generosity also supports the Office of Vocations' key programs, such as Quo Vadis, a summer camp for high school men discerning God's call (60 attendees in 2025), and the St. Andrew Dinner, which welcomed 140 young men interested in learning more about the priesthood this year.

The growth in vocations is a great blessing. Our diocese currently has 35 seminarians, including 15 in the new Propaedeutic Stage. Among them is Saint Matthew parishioner Griffin Gartner, and we look forward to welcoming back James Grossheim after he completes his final semester of seminary.

The fund also supports the growing Permanent Diaconate, which now includes 81 deacons serving in 36 parishes. On Dec. 20, seven men—including Saint Matthew parishioner Dan Ott—will be ordained. Another 10 men are in the diaconate formation for 2026, and a new Spanish-speaking cohort is beginning in 2026.

TONY'S REFLECTION

REACHING UP TO THE EXTRAORDINARY

Being consumed in the hubbub and general noise of life, it is easy to view all things you encounter under the same category. Religion gets grouped with all other activities. However, religion is meant to shape our culture, not be just another thing in culture. When Moses encountered God in the burning bush, God told Moses, "Put off your shoes from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." With this, God is showing us there needs to be a distinction, a separation of the ordinary from the divine. If the sacred is mingled with the everyday, we'll miss how the sacred takes us out of the commonplace to a higher place. In this, going to church must be distinct from going to a mere place of entertainment.

In the Old Testament, the temple was wholly unlike the everyday thing. In our first reading, the prophet Ezekiel has a vision of water flowing from the temple. Biblical scholars see this vision as a motif recalling the river of life flowing from Eden. Eden was viewed as the original garden-sanctuary of God. Later in the O.T., the temple personified not only Eden but all of creation. The Jewish scholar Josephus comments, "parts of the temple were in everyone, made in a way of imitation and representation of the universe." In short, the temple was a big deal to devout Jews. It was the only dwelling place of God in the world. It was the only place where you could offer sacrifices, and the temple was viewed as a microcosm of God's creation.

Yet, this sacred holy place became defiled, so much so that Jesus reacts rather aggressively. Jesus sees the temple has become overrun by merchants. Christ then proceeds to construct a whip and use it as a device to evict the buyers and sellers while flipping over their tables. Let's ponder what caused Jesus's forcible removal of these people from the temple.

Jesus sees commercialism and dishonest trade as utterly incompatible with the sacredness of divine worship and its venue. Conducting business was forbidden on the weekly Sabbath (Lev 23:3). Why? Because you are taking that which is sacred and mingling it with that which is ordinary, or in some sense, wicked. As Christ teaches, "Do not give dogs what is holy, and do not throw your pearls before swine" (Mt 7:6).

The temple cleansing then leads Christ to surmise its inevitable destruction. "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." John clarifies that "he spoke of the temple of his body." All that the temple is becomes embedded in Jesus. Therefore, every church with the Eucharist is infinitely holier than the Temple in Jerusalem, for that was but a type of the real presence of God. Given that we consume Jesus's body in the Eucharist, our bodies do what a temple does — become a dwelling place for God.

Instead of a house of worship, the temple became a place of frivolous activity. When we walk into church, we are walking into holy ground. At the Mass we are dealing with the highest sacred drama put to reality. Just like Moses did, let us remove the ordinary, the mundane, so that we can experience the extraordinary.


ABORTION HEALING RETREAT
