Dec. 25 - Mass is at 10 a.m. on Christmas Day. No 8 a.m. Mass.



TONY'S REFLECTION

TRUSTING IN GOD'S PLAN

In the 4th week of Advent, God's plan is announced to Mary and Joseph. To ponder what Mary and Joseph are going through, it is helpful to get the backstory of their relationship. Jewish weddings have two distinct stages: kiddushin and nisuin. After the first stage, there is a legal marriage that only death or divorce can break. A first-century husband had some time (upwards of a year) after the wedding to prepare a home for his new wife. When he brought his wife into the home, he would consummate the marriage by having physical relations with her.

Scripture indicated that Mary and Joseph were "betrothed" but not yet living together. This is code for being legally married but not yet having physical relations in their new home. It should be noted that there was no shame in having a physical union between the kiddushin and nisuin stages. Therefore, Mary and Joseph are legally married and are free to have sexual relations. What is obvious is that they don't have relations. Recall Mary's response to the angel's proclamation of bearing a son is, "How will this be, since I know not a man?" Mary's reply insinuates that she doesn't plan to have sex with her husband. Early Christian texts inform us that Mary had taken a vow of perpetual virginity to God. We might ask, if she took a vow of virginity, then why did she get married to Joseph? Unfortunately, an unwed Jewish virgin was a vulnerable target for the occupying Roman power to take advantage of. As a strong carpenter, Joseph was Mary's trusted husband and protector of her virginity. Of course, this would mean that Joseph would have taken a vow of virginity himself. The fact that Joseph knew that the child was not his implies he did not have physical relations with Mary, nor did he plan to because "he knew her not" (Mt. 1:24-25).

Nazareth was a small town. Joseph and Mary likely pronounced their virginal vows at their wedding, which the townspeople would have witnessed. Now that Mary is pregnant, the gossiping town will assume that they broke their vows. Yet, Joseph, being unwilling to put Mary's reputation to shame, shields her by "divorcing her quietly" and leaving the scene. By leaving, in effect, Joseph is telling the townspeople it was me who is to blame. Joseph is willing to spend the rest of his life being thought of as having taken advantage of, then abandoned, his young wife so that Mary's character does not become tarnished.

While Joseph protects Mary from the local slander, he still must grapple with the nature of her pregnancy. There are various theories as to what Joseph initially knew or did not know about Mary's pregnancy. One theory is called "The Reverence Theory." Under this view, Joseph does not think Mary has committed adultery, as he does not doubt her purity and innocence. He is aware of Isaiah's prophecy that a virgin shall bear a son and sees his virginal bride as the fulfillment of this prophecy. He knows something divine is going on. However, being a humble man, he considered himself unworthy to take care of Mary and be the father of the King Child. As a just man, he knows that Mary belongs to God, and he considers himself unworthy to live with her. Therefore, he decides to separate himself quietly out of justice for God and reverence for Mary.

Whichever theory is true, before Joseph took action, God sent an angel to remind him of his royal lineage as a descendant of David and how the Messiah would come from this line. This story and the exchange between Joseph and the angel contain a message for us as well—don't be petrified to participate in God's saving plan. We can also reflect that God's saving plan could place us in similar roles to Joseph (as husband and father) and Mary (as wife and mother). This season, let us contemplate how we can mimic Mary and Joseph's part in putting trust in God to play a part in leading us to the Christ Child.


CONFIRMATION RETREAT
