

Jan. 1 - Mass is 9 a.m. on Jan. 1. No 8 a.m. Mass.


PASSION OF CHRIST PRAYER GROUP


FIRST FRIDAY ADORATION


Merry Christmas from Saint Matthew! As we reflect on the past year, we are grateful for the many blessings God has poured out upon our parish community and for the faithful generosity you continue to show in support of our Church.

Here at Saint Matthew, 2025 has been a year marked by growth and joy. We were especially blessed to recently celebrate the ordinations of Deacon Dan Ott to the permanent diaconate and Deacon James Grossheim to the transitional diaconate—powerful signs of God's work among us and the vitality of our local Church. These milestones echo a broader story of grace across the Diocese of Nashville, which was recently recognized by Catholic World Report as the most fruitful diocese in the United States based on key indicators of spiritual life and sacramental growth.

With grateful hearts, we are pleased to share that Saint Matthew has reached its goal for the Bishop's Annual Appeal for Ministries. Including current pledges for 2025, our parish has raised more than \$172,000 as of December 22, exceeding our goal of \$171,000. TONY'S REFLECTION

KEEPING THE JOY IN CHRISTMAS

The secular world tends to ransack the days after December 25 to prep for New Year's while viewing Christmas in the rearview mirror. Yet, in the Church, now is when we begin our Christmas celebration—not early December. Given this point, let us revert to the prominent theme of "joy" during the Christmas season. In many great Christmas entertainments we watch, there are villains who threaten to keep Christmas from coming. The Grinch wanted to steal Christmas away by pilfering its decorations—but the people celebrated Christmas anyway. Scrooge would have the day and its humbug killed off by the sheer force of his stinginess—but he later comes to regret his joylessness, and in the end, he, too, keeps the festive day.

In the real Christmas story, we see villains abound. King Herod wanted to kill the newborn King. In the early centuries of the Church, heretics attempted to alter the meaning of Christmas by denying the incarnation. Gnostics and Docetists claimed that Jesus wasn't really human and did not arrive as a child born on Christmas Day, while Arians denied that Jesus was God. In our day, a prominent spokesperson of the World Economic Forum declared that "Jesus is fake news." However, all these efforts to thwart God's plan and actions in our world fade away in our celebrations of this season. The joy of the Christmas season cannot be crushed or silenced by outside forces. In fact, Christmas joy may expand in the face of opposition, as we can see in the case of the Grinch and Scrooge.

In a world of deception and darkness, Christmas shines uniquely as a beacon of truth and light. The faithful's response to this divine illumination in our chaotic world is one of awe, reverence, and finally joy. Joy surfaces because we are in desperate need of Christ.

You can't help but witness joy during the Christmas season. This joy includes all people. It comprises the wise, represented by the Magi, and the poor, represented by the shepherds. What both groups have in common is their joy. Even people clueless to the true meaning of Christmas often exhibit a sense of joy at the heart of Christmas. While Christmas commercialism often makes me wince, in an odd way, it's an acknowledgment of Christmas joy. Consumerism is our feeble human attempt to put happiness in our lives—giving people gifts. Pope Benedict observed, "Why do we give gifts? Because God has given himself to us as a gift, wrapping His divinity in true humanity." Our secular "joy" in giving and getting stuff on Christmas in a way alludes to the entire world receiving the gift of Jesus.

Life is filled with bursts of happiness, but sustained joy is rare. We can find this prolonged joy when we realize the meaning of Christmas—that God loves us so much, He has come into our world and remains with us to the close of time (Mt. 28:21).

Life is a grind. However, these moments of joy can get us through. Let Christ's birth into our human world encircle you with joy. Let this season sparkle as a pulsating light among the rest of the days you live.

YOUTH RETREATS


CONFIRMATION RETREAT
