January 18: Tony Jesse (Catholic Social Teaching, part 1)

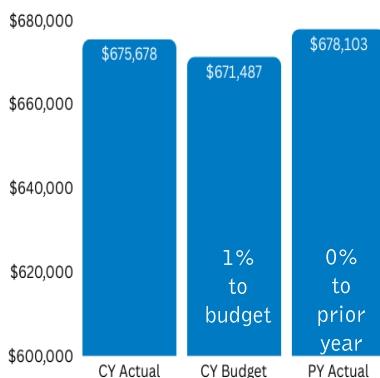

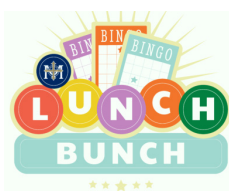

The Tennessee Education Freedom Scholarship (EFS) Program has announced key dates for the 2025-2026 school year.

The application window for 2026-2027 EFS new applicants or applicants that applied last year and did not receive the funds opens on January 13, 2026 at 12 p.m. CT.

We highly encourage you to start gathering the required documents and have them scanned and saved to your computer for easy access once the application opens. An EFS Application Checklist and a Step-by-Step Guide for the EFS Application can be found in the current School News of the Week email or by visiting the EFS website at tn.gov/education/efs/resources.

Please note: To be eligible to receive tuition assistance directly from Saint Matthew, families must complete the EFS application.

MORNING COFFEE AT FATHER RYAN

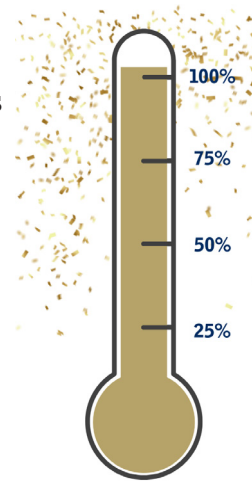



TONY'S REFLECTION

KEEPING THE JOY IN CHRISTMAS

The common dictionary definition for the word “epiphany” is a sudden insight or intuitive understanding. With epiphany, one grapples with a concept for some time, then at a certain point, finally “gets it.” In the revealing of an idea, having an epiphany results in a delight in the intellect. You derive joy from abruptly understanding something. As humans, we are all craving the truth. However, the seeking of the truth is an arduous task, as sin has clouded our intellect and weakened our will. That is why finding these pockets of truth through an epiphany results in enjoyment. The secular definition of epiphany stems from a Catholic ethos that we commemorate today. The Epiphany celebrates the manifestation of the divine nature of Jesus to the Gentiles, embodied by the figures of the magi. St. Matthew gives us a brief description of the magi, denoting that they came “from the East.” For them, “the East” was the huge territory controlled by the Nabateans known as Persia.

Historians and theologians deduce that, as wise men, the magi would have been astrologers, but also students of the prophecies from different cultures, including the Jewish prophecies. While eastern sages in Persia studied the stars, they also viewed the cosmos as a master of divine nature. In this, the magi didn’t merely dabble in astrology; as classical pagans, they viewed the stars as divine. What is more, is that we can place these ancient magi on par with sorcerers and practitioners of the black arts in that they worked with various spells and incantations to read the stars. Sorcerers of black magic were common practice in Persia. Even modern magicians view the word “magi” as the fulfillment of the concept of “magic.” As Father Longenecker articulates, “The word ‘magician’ comes from the Persian ‘magus,’ the name of the venerable sect of the occult, astrologically adept wizards.” Sorcerers in the ancient world attempted to penetrate the supernatural through illusion or other dark ways void of God.

The gifts the magi delivered to Jesus remain covertly significant. In the ancient world, if you did come before a king, you would bring them a tribute that the king’s crown rights possessed you and all that is yours. Typically, the tribute you would present to a king would consist of something precious to your vocation and very livelihood. In this way, you would symbolically express that your whole work is given to the king. When we see this, we can grasp that there must be something the magi are revealing in presenting Jesus with gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Gold, frankincense, and myrrh were used by magi in crafting their spells to read the stars. Therefore, these gifts of the magi signify the tools of trade for these ancient sorcerers. By giving Jesus the instruments of their work, it reveals that the magi were dramatically giving up their pagan lifestyle and surrendering their entire being to Jesus.

It is fascinating that in The Epiphany, we see that the rising light of God manifested itself to those who were geographically distant and spiritually far-off. As the light of the Epiphany bursts into all areas, may all accept His divine revealed light.
