FROM THE DEACON'S DESK

If you wanted to start a revolution, where would you begin? You cannot start a revolution without gathering a group of followers who believe in your vision. On the one hand, you could begin with your friends, family, and neighbors, who already know and respect you. On the other hand, you could go to the nation's capital, as very many pro-lifers did this week, in order to convince the influential people who live there and govern the rest of us. Your initial band of followers may include ordinary people or powerful public figures—but which approach is more likely to succeed?



Some movements chose the latter, influencing cultural and political leaders. Even Catholic missionaries, such as the "Apostle to England," St. Augustine of Canterbury, chose the lords and rulers of England for his first audience. Humanly speaking, this is the best way to influence opinions, challenge the status quo, and enact change.

God's ways, however, are not our ways. Jesus chose to preach first not to the Roman Emperor, Pontius Pilate, or even the chief priests in Jerusalem, nor did he begin with his childhood friends or relatives. Instead, he left his hometown and settled in Capernaum. There, not Rome or Jerusalem, he gathered followers from the average strangers who lived there: fishermen, laborers, tax collectors, and sinners. From Capernaum, he traveled all over Galilee, preaching to ordinary people.

Jesus had a revolution to begin, which continues today. Eventually, that revolution would reach Jerusalem and later Rome. From Rome, the revolution spread like wildfire across the known world, and today it reaches further than those fishermen could ever have imagined. The revolution continues still, and today it aims to set our hearts on fire for the cause. Today, we are the average people called to follow Jesus, so that through us his Kingdom will continue to spread and incorporate every human family.

TONY'S REFLECTION

GOD'S DREAM FOR YOU

Because I grew up in an Irish Catholic neighborhood in Chicago, everyone seemed to be magnetically drawn to Notre Dame football, myself included. That is why when the movie "Rudy" came out in 1993, I watched it with lively interest as an eager teenager. In the movie, we notice that Rudy has a deep love for Notre Dame football and desperately had a dream to play it there. Most of Rudy's family and friends scoffed at him and told him, "Chasing a dream causes nothing but heartache." However, his best friend Pete encouraged Rudy to pursue his dreams as he affirmed, "Having dreams is what makes life tolerable." While following his dream seemed daunting and improbable, something set Rudy off. Something sparked him to make his dream his reality. It was the tragic death of his best friend, Pete. This story illuminates that often there is a single event that ushers in the clear mission that a person knows he is destined for.

Thus far in Matthew's Gospel, we have been leading up to the start of Jesus's public ministry. Today, His ministry officially starts. Today, He moves into action. And what was the defining moment that triggered Jesus's public mission? His friend, His cousin, John, has been unjustly arrested. This event hit home for Christ and ignited Him into the mission He knew He came for. After this, He left Nazareth and went to Galilee. Jesus targets Galilee as the place to begin reversing the tragedies of Israel's history by restoring the twelve tribes of the New Covenant and shepherding the people away from false worship and towards God's kingdom.

Let us investigate our interior to see if there is an event that can spark us into a holy purpose. Take stock of the scenes in your life and look to that central experience that changed you in some way. Perhaps there was one moment that catapulted you from a jokester to a person of maturity and character. It could have been the birth of your child, the death of a loved one, or the scenes of corruption in our world. Whatever it is, look to that defining moment as a resurgence to become the person God created you to be and to be sent on His mission. God often uses these weighty moments in life to provoke a surge towards His will.

From the heavenly vantage point, our central dream to pursue should be to become a saint. Oftentimes, the pursuit of God's "dream" for us to become a saint gets stalled—be it through naysayers, the culture, or our own blunders. Let us look to Christ as our example. He was confronted with all sorts of opponents that attempted to thwart His mission of self-giving love on the cross—even from His inner circle (see Matt. 16:21-23). However, He was squarely focused on His mission at hand. His unyielding love and union with the Father allowed Him to embrace His work of redemption with passion. The faith beckons us to greatness. Let us go forward and not be anxious to pursue our "dream" to be a saint.
