A MESSAGE FROM FATHER RAINES

If you ever come to daily Mass at Saint Matthew, you will know that the congregation says the Hail Mary and Saint Michael Prayer together after Mass each day. I learned of this about three and a half years ago, when I celebrated my first daily Mass after being appointed pastor. We didn't include the prayers that day, of course, since I didn't know about the practice. After Mass, a parishioner kindly explained that this had long been the custom of the parish. I was aware that many parishes in our diocese do this, as well as some whole dioceses in our country, so it seemed like a reasonable thing to continue. As time went on, I found it to be a really great way to pray after Mass before leaving.

When we went through our strategic planning process in 2024-2025 to strengthen Saint Matthew Catholic Church and School, and plan for the future, one of the ideas that came out of the plan, inspired by our daily Masses, was to begin saying these prayers after our Tuesday and Thursday school Masses as well. We began doing that almost a year ago, after the celebration of Easter last year. All of our SMS students and teachers learned the Saint Michael Prayer and our student cantors have been leading the student body in saying these prayers after every school Mass. Since that time, we have had a lot of interest from parishioners in extending that to our weekend Masses as well.

Lent is an opportune time to try this out, as our parish has had a Lenten tradition for many years of not doing a closing hymn at Mass, but rather ending Mass with the ringing of a bell. It's also a time in which many of us seek to incorporate new spiritual practices in our relationship with the Lord. So, this Lent we will try out saying the Hail Mary and Saint Michael Prayer together after our weekend Masses like we have been doing after our daily and school Masses.

This practice comes from Pope Leo XIV's predecessor, Leo XIII. The idea is that we have just heard the word of the Lord and received Jesus in the Eucharist at Mass, and now we are called to take him out into the world with us. We ask for the intercession of our Blessed Mother and the prayers and protection of Saint Michael as we do this so that the Lord Jesus may conquer evil and we may be strengthened in our own battles. If you don't know this prayer already, don't worry! It will be printed in the music leaflet in your pew that we will be using this Lent.




OFFICES CLOSED





BE FEARLESS THIS LENT

Time and again, the people of God are called to “be courageous” and “be not afraid.” Yet, we live in a time where fear seems to guide our



very existence. This Lent our Adult Faith Formation Ministry will be using Chris Stefanick’s series, *Fearless*, to approach our Lenten sacrifices with Christian courage and conviction. TONY’S REFLECTION

THE NEW FULFILLS THE OLD

People tend to view the Old Testament and New Testament as two stories going in opposite directions. However, this Sunday, we witness a harmonic synthesis in the interplay of the old and the new. The readings in Sirach and the Psalm convey the importance of God’s laws in the Old Testament. Then in the Gospel, Jesus says He has not come to abolish the Law of Moses and the teaching of the prophets, but to fulfill them. Here, we see a completion and expansion in the story of God’s healing process. The law in the OT is designed to keep Israel firmly near God while simultaneously away from peril. God established the Mosaic Law after the abhorrent scene in which Israel worshiped the Egyptian god embodied in a golden calf. The whole point of the law is to act as a buffer to guide God’s people away from the false idolatry encircling their lives. Therefore, the law acts as a preventive measure all the while steering one closer toward the divine path.

Because we live in a fallen world and are inclined to sin, the law acts as a helpful deterrent much like a life jacket is to an adventurous four-year-old as they run on an ocean dock. The four-year-old may complain that the life jacket the father demands he wears is “restrictive” but that doesn’t take away from the reality that wearing the life jacket allows the boy to remain close to his father rather than risk being tragically pulled away to the depths of the ocean.

However, the story of healing does not end with the external act of the law. There needs to be a transformation in the interior disposition of the soul. When the four-year-old obeys the “law” and wears the life jacket, this is good, but incomplete by itself. It would be far better to eliminate the child’s rebellious urge to withdraw himself from the loving father altogether. Therefore, the external act of the law actually points to the more pressing matter – the interior change of the person.

Jesus is showing us that outward observance of the law is not sufficient. It is not enough that we do not murder, commit adultery, or lie. We must take these warped desires out at the source. While following laws may deter threats, for the act of sin to be eliminated, one needs to go deep into his interior and boldly remove his deformed thoughts so he can attain union with God. To be sure, taking custody of one’s thoughts so they are saintly is no easy undertaking in our hyperactive secular world. While this process may take years in the making, when we humbly receive Christ’s grace transferred to us in the sacraments, our dubious motives are curtailed and we become molded closer to His interior.

From the heavenly vantage point, we are analogous to the four-year-old who is instructed to wear the life jacket as he darts across the dock. Yes, dutifully wearing the life jacket is admirable, but do we go beyond this and allow our interior to refrain from running away from God and instead hold his hand, so no life jacket is necessary?

Drivers must be male. **Innkeepers** may be male or female. (At least one Innkeeper must be male.)

Additional RITI volunteer roles include: hospitality, cooking dinner, providing breakfast or bagged lunches, washing linens, and a shower assistant (must be male). While there are only a limited number of volunteer slots remaining for the 25-26 year, we are actively building our volunteer base for this fall and beyond. RISE SCHEDULE NOTES


