




- 4:30 p.m. JV Boys - SMS White vs. SMS Navy

## TONY'S REFLECTION

### SALTING THE EARTH

In today’s Gospel, Jesus presents us with three images that represent God’s people and what we are called to do. The images He impels us to reflect on are salt, light, and mountain.

Salt was a highly valued mineral and an expensive commodity in the ancient world. Many cultures used salt as a seasoning, a preservative, a disinfectant, and a key component of ceremonial offerings. Salt, as a chemical compound, cannot change. Because salt cannot be altered, or ruined, it is naturally pure. Therefore, biblically speaking, salt signifies that which is pure and can’t be defiled. One such example occurs when Elisha went out to the spring of water and threw salt in it, saying, “Thus says the LORD, ‘I have purified these waters; there shall no longer be death or unfruitfulness from there any longer.’” Because salt was a sign of permanence and purity, God forever aligned His kingdom with Israel’s by a “covenant of salt” (2 Chron 13: 5-8, Lev 2:13). Understanding salt’s preserving quality, we are called as well to conserve the deposit of faith that Christ has given to us and resist the temptation to alter it into a watered-down version pleasing to the world.

Jesus next invokes an image of light to explain how with it, all can see and all are drawn to its illumination. Light’s self-giving quality projects outward, allowing others’ scope of vision to be enhanced. The theme of light calls the Church to be a lighthouse or beacon summoning the anxious world to the safe harbor with God.

Interestingly, the harsh ice storm we experienced presses the point home even more so. Salt gave us traction on the icy elements while light and heat were in desperate need. While not wanting to provoke PTSD from the storm, the more prominent display is that light and salt both have disinfectant and preservative properties. The Church as “light” and “salt” refers to her role to identify and counteract sin, which, in turn, conserves society from decay.

Lastly, the image is a “city on a mountain.” While some translations describe a hill, you get the point—God is giving us a vision of a high point. A mountain or hill stands above the rest and arouses one to ascend to a higher place. More importantly, it gives to those below. Without the peaks of mountains, all the plains and valleys would be as barren as the Sahara. It is the flow of water from the mountains that gives us rivers and reservoirs, which create earth’s fertility. Therefore, this city set way above is simultaneously meant to serve those below and inspire them to climb higher.

God is calling us to do what salt, light, and a mountain do—use itself as a gift for others. How this plays out is as our faith increases, allowing us to be wiser, purer, and ascend to greatness, we must use the God-given attributes in our faith to draw others to God. To be sure, this is not an easy proposition, but as God inspires us, we, in turn, can be God’s instrument to do His work.

### FROM THE DEACON'S DESK (DCN. GROSSHEIM)

Nobody likes to be left in the dark. Yet most of us have recently spent far more time than usual in the dark. The recent storm and ensuing power outages left us cold and in the dark. Even today, some homes remain cold and dark. We may have found alternative methods of lighting and heating our homes, but the truth is that our conventional source of light failed, and our homes were, at least momentarily, dark.



This storm came in the dead of winter, when nights are long and daylight is short. Remarkably, the Church calendar anticipates our lack of natural light, and even possibly of artificial light, during the colder months. In December we celebrated Christmas, when in the bleak midwinter, the Light of the World was born, a brightly clothed angel chorus glorified God, and a star led the way to Bethlehem. Traditionally, we illuminate the darkness of December and January by lighting up our houses, streets, porches, and windows. On Monday we celebrated Candlemas, commemorating the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple, when the Light of the World entered into his Temple in human form for the first time. That same Light now illuminates the Church, the fulfillment of the old Temple. Tuesday was the Memorial of St. Blaise, when we bless throats using two candles. Just as Jesus entered into the Jerusalem Temple, we bring candles, sources of light, close to our bodies, which, as St. Paul says, are living temples of the Holy Spirit, and receive God's blessing.

We may have recently sat in the darkness, but without electric lights, maybe we could better see the true Light of the World. With that Light within us, we are commanded to shine that light before others who still sit in darkness and may not even know it.

### RISE SCHEDULE NOTES


